development along South Virginia Street.




South Virginia Street Transit-Oriented Development Overview

SEIZING OPPORTUNITY ON SOUTH VIRGINIA STREET

Promoting denser development at Transit Focus Areas throughout the corridor will be the most effective path forward to achieving the transit and development goals. Elected officials, community leaders, developers and planning professionals have the opportunity to coalesce around a shared vision of targeted growth and density in the areas of greatest opportunity as identified in this project. The plan identifies nearly 700 acres of vacant land as well as land-use tools and economic incentives that could encourage density and transit-supportive

development. Success will lead to: more walkable, bikable, transitfriendly corridor, local economic growth, increased social equity, enviornmental benefits and health and lifestyle improvements.

Create regions with short transit commutes

Promote non-motorized transportation networks



Transit



Locate development near high-quality public transportation

Densify



Optimize density and match transit capacity

Shift



Increase mobility options, encourage development standards and complete streets that support a shift from auto dependency

The Vision for South Virginia Street Multimodal Improvements

NDOT is currently reviewing alternative improvements in the South Virginia Street Safety Management Plan from Patriot Boulevard to the Mount Rose Highway. The proposed concept is subject to change.
